The arts community is in crisis, and the pandemic's effects are just a portion of that impact. This strategic partnership will further strengthen our collective impact, leveraging our respective strengths and resources to better serve the needs of our members and stakeholders.


WHO WE ARE


WHAT WE DO






COLLABORATIONS & PARTNERSHIPS

Throughout the year, the Council facilitated monthly meetings, fostering collaboration and dialogue among members. Initiatives like the Ottawa Arts Initiative (OAI) and the Alliance of Arts Councils of Ontario (AACO) provided platforms for sharing knowledge, peer support, and advocacy efforts. Additionally, active participation in the Arts Court Collective and frequent engagements with community partners strengthened the Council's commitment to promoting the social and economic significance of arts and culture in Ottawa.









ADVOCATING FOR THE ARTS

In anticipation of municipal and provincial elections, the Council spearheaded efforts to engage and support the Ottawa arts community. Through targeted advocacy campaigns, resources were created and shared to encourage active participation in committee meetings and through social media initiatives and web campaigns. By galvanizing the community, the Council amplified the importance of arts advocacy on political platforms - including ensuring greater representation of Arts and Culture in the City Council Terms of Priorities.



The Council played a pivotal role in adjudicating awards, celebrating the accomplishments of local artists, arts leaders, and community supporters. From the Ottawa Arts Council Awards presentation to the adjudication of various grants and awards, the Council highlighted and honored the diverse talents shaping Ottawa's cultural landscape.





COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT AND EVENTS

From the Bodys Exhibition challenging societal norms to the Mandala Spotlight showcasing IBPOC artists' contributions, the Council continued to foster inclusivity and creativity through various exhibitions and events. Initiatives like the Ottawa BlackJacks Artists of the Game bringing live painting alongside the basketball game, to the WISE Youth Art Event which both provided platforms for emerging artists to showcase their work while engaging with the community.







COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT AND EVENTS





EDUCATIONAL AND OUTREACH INITIATIVES

The Council remained committed to fostering learning and civic engagement through initiatives like the Synapcity Civics Boot Camp and Arts Awards Public Info Sessions. By providing opportunities for citizens to understand governance structures and arts award processes, the Council empowered individuals to actively participate in shaping their communities' cultural landscape.



Our popular visual arts fundraiser, LUCK!, returned to an in-person event this year. Over 45 participants donated work, which expanded this year to include other creative arts experiences. We raised more than \$10,000 in support for the Council. Fifty per cent of funds raised are being dedicated to the second year of the ActivArts Micro-grant Program.









PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

This year the Council broadened its reach by developing professional development videos, workshops and skill-building tools to support artists' development, offered in English, French, Arabic and Chinese. Alongside this initiative, we partnered with Arts Network Ottawa to develop free Community Conversations events that centred on non-profit leadership and adaptation of the sector.

FULL SPECTRUM



In March 2023, the Council launched the Full Spectrum Series, featuring eight professionally produced videos addressing artist and organizational support. The Series was distributed to more than 1300 arts organizations globally. This initiative aimed to disseminate valuable insights, empowering self-employed artists and arts organizations with practical professional development topics, from online operations to brand strategy and beyond.

COMMUNITY CONVERSATIONS

Arts Network Ottawa and the Ottawa Arts Council embarked on a series of co-creation opportunities where the arts sector and community were invited to engage in crucial conversations. The seven presentations, five in English and two in French, shared insights and explored innovative ideas, transformative strategies, and visionary perspectives to spark our thinking and our collective work in the arts.













ACTIVART MICRO-GRANTS

This year marked the pilot year for the development of a micro-grant program. This program was a direct result of community feedback aiming to support artists in their creative endeavors. The ActivArt Micro-Grants program wasdivided into two funding streams: the ActivArt Artist Grant covers various expenses related to artistic practice, with amounts ranging from \$250 to \$500. The ActivArt Neighbourhood Grant fosters community engagement and social change through arts-based initiatives, offering funding between \$500 and \$1000.

ACTIVART MICRO-GRANTS

More than 200 applications were received in the pilot year. Emphasizing equity and reconciliation, priority was given to projects led by Indigenous, Black, or members of equitydeserving groups, including racialized individuals, persons with disabilities, and members of the 2SLGBTQ+ communities. Ten worthy recipients were awarded the grants, each with unique projects that reflect the creativity of our local arts sector.



A SECTOR THAT IS STRONGER TOGETHER

The decision to merge the Ottawa Arts Council and Arts Network Ottawa gained significant momentum in 2023. At the end of 2023, The Ottawa Arts Council and Arts Network Ottawa embarked on a series of co-creation opportunities where the arts sector and community were invited to engage in crucial conversations. More than 400 voices were heard. These presentations shared insights, explored innovative ideas, transformative strategies and visionary perspectives to spark our thinking and our collective work in the arts. Presentations were followed by facilitated workshops geared directly towards the merger process.

Themes from these gatherings, along with community input, shaped the Design-Thinking workshops that took place in March 2024, where more than 40 community members gathered to help shape the heart and vision of the new organization as it relates to governance, decision-making, operations, programs and services.




